NEWS OF IOPC-VI

The sixth conference of the International Organization of Paleobotany (IOPC-VI) was held in Qunhuangdo, China July 30 - August 3, 2000. Nearly two hundred participants enjoyed the three and a half day scientific program, and the great wall tour to Laolongtou and Jiaoshan. The program included eleven symposia, eight contributed oral presentation sessions, and two poster sessions. Plenary lectures were delivered by Bill Chaloner (UK), Tom Taylor (USA), and Zhang Miman IOPC-VI was rounded out by three (China). conference field trips, two workshops, and a Beijing suburbs tour. Reports of the various field trips and the Beijing Suburbs Tour will appear in a later Newsletter. We congratulate Li Xingxue and the Chinese Organizing Committee for hosting this fine conference.

2000 GENERAL COUNCIL MEETING

At IOPC-VI, the evening of August 1, 2000 was devoted to the IOP General Council Meeting. Election of new officers and selection of a host for the next IOPC were the two main items of business. Counting and tabulation of votes took more than an hour, providing ample time for thorough discussions of policies for choosing meeting dates and locations, and evaluations of proposals to host the next IOPC. There was considerable discussion about the practice of scheduling IOPCs in conjunction with Palynological Congresses. There was general agreement that this practice was desirable, but that more coordination was needed to allow the IOP to participate in decisions about dates and places for future meetings. No vote was taken, and there was considerable sentiment for leaving the decision open.

For the forthcoming IOPC, interest was expressed in several options, providing an opportunity to hold our next meeting in such diverse locations as Argentina, Spain and Wales. Discussions of the alternatives focused on several topics. These

included rotation of meetings among geographical regions, ease of attendance for large numbers of participants from different geographical regions, costs for participants from different geographical regions, availability and ease of transportation, availability of housing facilities, opportunities for field trips, adequacy of meetings facilities, funding opportunities, and staffing assets. Although there was considerable enthusiasm about the exciting alternatives, the membership was unable to reach a consensus about which invitation to accept because none included enough detail to satisfy concerns in several areas of discussion. In the end, the membership decided to defer a decision. incoming Secretary was instructed to request specific details from each of the perspective hosts, and the incoming Executive was charged with the responsibilities of devising a mechanism for deciding among invitations and accepting the most appropriate bid. Additional information about this process is included later in this newsletter.

CALL FOR MORE DETAILED PROPOSALS TO HOST IOPC- VII

Due to a lack of specific details submitted with earlier proposals the membership was unable to decide on the location of the next IOPC meeting (see report of the 2000 General Council Meeting). Therefore, we are renewing the call for invitations to host IOPC-VII in 2004. Those who have previously submitted invitations to host the next IOPC are particularly encouraged to provide more detailed proposals.

Guidelines for materials to be submitted are available from the Secretary upon request. Proposals may be submitted as e-mail attachments and/or mailed to Secretary – IOP, C/O Dr. Ruth Stockey, Department of Biological Sciences, University of Alberta, Edmonton, Alberta T6G 2E9, Canada <rothwell@ualberta.ca>.

If more than one detailed proposal is submitted, the executive will confer to choose the next host by majority vote. Applications will be due on or before January 15, 2001. The successful proposal will be chosen, and the applicants will be notified before the end of January, 2001. Another area of priority is continuation of the work on the Fossil Record Database in which our previous secretary Mike Boulter and many other colleagues have already investigated a great deal of time and energy. We believe that this database offers a useful tool in many palaeobotanical disciplines, and we consider it important to continue expanding and improving the database. It is our hope that you will help us develop other priorities for the future work of IOP. Our new secretary is energetic and eager to take up new challenges so please bombard him with good ideas and suggestions. I look forward to the four years service as president of IOP and hope that together we can make a difference.
